East Angel

Campaign For The New Counseling Center At East High School

Chances are, if you graduated from East within the past 40 years, you share a common memory of the counseling center. Come fall, 2014, this may change. At January's welcome back breakfast for faculty, Principal Andy Mendelsberg announced exciting plans for an overhaul of both the Guidance Counseling Center and the Future Center (college counseling) — spaces currently separated by a classroom. While not much has changed about the physical space of East's counseling program, there has been tremendous progress in students' postsecondary paths and the space needs to be renovated to support this progress.

In 2013, more than 90% of East High School seniors graduated. That's in comparison to 59% for traditional DPS high schools. Of those graduates, 88% went on to pursue post-secondary education at either four-year (76%) or two-year (12%) institutions. When you overlay the facts that 36% of East's 2,400 students receive free



and reduced lunch and that 20% of them are "first generation" students, these statistics are truly impressive.

This progress is due to the dedication of teachers, counseling staff, and most of all, students. Commensurate with such growth, the number of students requiring counseling has increased dramatically as has use of the counseling centers in all areas: academic counseling, psycho-social counseling, college application, and financial aid. The counseling center is used by 2,400 East students, faculty, adult volunteers, the vast majority of East parents, and more than 250 college recruiters. For many, it is the first impression visitors have of East High

At the request of Principal Mendelsberg, the East Angel Friends & Alumni Foundation (EAFAF) provided \$50,000 to fund architectural fees for the design of a new counseling center and for the determination of its cost in May 2013. Initial designs were completed in September. In addition to combining the two counseling spaces and greatly enhancing student and staff efficiency, key project features include:

• The expanded center will be air-conditioned and provide approximately 3,600 sq. ft for the existing counseling staff and three additional staff members

A staffed reception area, a large central open space for collaborative sessions, large group gatherings, college presentations as well as private counseling offices.

As college admission and financial assistance programs are now administered online, technology enhancements will ensure rapid online access throughout the space.

The aesthetic design of the new space will reflect historic architectural elements of the main building.

East's building was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 2006 and is 90 years old; all funds from recent bond initiatives are allocated thru 2017 to maintenance and im-

provement of the building's infrastructure. Therefore, a fundraising campaign was approved by EAFAF to support the approximately \$570,000 project. The campaign has raised funds and pledges sufficient to secure the commencement of the project. The remaining \$40,000 in funds will be raised during the first quarter of 2014. Contracts will be awarded and the counseling center will be complete when school opens in

Justin Brierly: Most Distinguished Educators One of Denver's

When East High alums gather at the school for a class reunion, much of the talk is about special adults who helped shape their values, work ethic and careers. One name

which comes up in the discussions a lot is Justin W. Brierly, perhaps one of East's most colorful and effective teacher/counselors.

Justin Brierly was fiercely proud of his Columbia University degree and the kind of education he received there. He was distressed over the lack of attention shown by Ivy League schools on students isolated in the middle of the country. He was convinced that East High had a fair number of students who should be granted admission to these prestigious schools and he made it a life-long career to place promising students into elite colleges.

One of his students, Norman Augustine, recalled how he was called into Mr. Brierly's office and handed two packets to fill out one to Princeton University and the other to Williams College. "I had no thought that I could get into such colleges, as very few Denver students did. He must have seen something in me and I chose Princeton." Norm would graduate with honors and would fashion out a career as a CEO of a major aerospace company.

Justin was born in 1905, and after graduating from college, moved to Denver in 1937, and was hired to teach English at Denver East High School. At that time, many teachers served as counselors, but Justin would take counseling a step beyond the normal expectations. For 14 years he taught East students to value learning and to develop an appetite for the world's finest literature. He knew they would need this experience to survive at these universities.

He was so good at his job that in 1951 he was moved downtown to become the supervisor of College and Guidance for the DPS. His impact on the entire system was immeasurable. He also served on the committee for the Ivy League Scholarship Board in Denver. During World War II, Justin was invited by Prime Minister Winston Churchill to come to England and be a consultant for the evacuation of children from urban areas which were under high risk from Ger-

man bombing. He would retire from the DPS in 1971 ending a 36

Justin was a practicing attorney and a patron of the performing arts. He served as the director of the Central City Opera House from 1937-1948. He was also a board member of the American Committee of Emigres in the Professions and an advisor to the board of the Institute of International Education. Upon his retirement, he served as the assistant to the president of Colorado Women's College and while there established the Martha Faure Carson Dance Library as a tribute to his life-long friend. Upon his death, the library was renamed the Carson-Brierly Dance Library and is now a part of the Penrose Library at the University of Denver.

East High School is currently active in the placement of students in college and in keeping the department of college counseling vital and modern. Much of the success of students in the years from 1937-1971 is due to Justin W. Brierly, whose obituary in the Rocky Mountain News had the following tribute: "Justin W. Brierly was one of Denver's most distinguished educators."


Hello All In The Land Of Angels:

ALUMNI WINGS

Monty Cleworth, Class of 1978

— has spent his adult life in pursuit of projects and ideas that sustain the quality of life for his lifelong home of Denver, Colo.



He graduated from East High School in 1978. Known for his academic success, he was also involved in the *Spotlight*, the East High Speech Team and was a member of the Angel tennis team. Monty attended Amherst College, graduating in 1982, with a degree in economics. In 1984, he earned a master's degree in business from Stanford University.

Before joining Monticello Associates, an investment management firm, in 1997, he worked at Hanifen, Imhoff Inc. and Founders Asset Management LLC. He is well-known in Denver for his devotion to worthy causes and is a major contributor to projects such as the Snowmass Mastodon Project, the Colorado Coalition for the Homeless, the Denver Art Museum, the Denver Museum of Nature and Science (DMNS), among others.

He sits on the board of DMNS and is involved with the Edwin Carter Legacy Society, which encourages people to work in the museum as part of their estate planning. He is a true citizen of Denver and was one of the first to purchase one of the Museum Residences in the Golden Triangle. He is a world traveler, a climber of the world's mountains, and a regular marathoner for a charity cause.

Monty showed his appreciation for his alma mater with a generous donation that allowed the Heritage Hall Committee to build two new cases for future inductions.

Phil Goodstein, Class of 1970

— Seldom does a year pass that it appears Phil Goodstein has published another book about some aspect of Denver's history. The



native Coloradan and eastsider is one of Denver's most prolific free-lance urban historians. His most recently published book is *Lumber Baron Inn: Denver's Mystery Mansion*.

Phil attended East High School and graduated in 1970. He earned three degrees in history, a BA from Metro State College, an MA from the University of Denver and a PhD from the University of Colorado. His main historical focus was on Eastern European History. He has deep roots in the Denver Jewish community and has written about Jewish influence in the political, economic and cultural aspects of Denver life.

Much in the style of the muckraker journalists of the early 20th century, Philip's works offer a view of the importance of the many and different neighborhoods that make up Denver's history.

Tina Walls, Class of 1973 — Tina attended East High School during the civil rights movement. Born in Little Rock, Arkansas, she was the younger sister of Carlotta Walls LaNier, a member of the Little Rock Nine. In a recent *Denver Post* article, Tina said that al-

though she remembered only bits and pieces of that time, the fact that her sister and parents fought for access to education play-



ed a huge part in her own career.

Tina earned a degree in administration of legal processes at Mills

tration of legal processes at Mills College in Oakland, California. "I am a product of the Denver Public Schools, the Denver Central Library and the Natural History Museum. They were my refuges." She would spend her adult career dedicated to education and the

The Urban League awarded her the Douglas H. McGannon Award which pointed out her dedication to "breaking down barriers and widening the doors of equal opportunity.

She left the halls of corporate America in 2009 and would retire from the Altria Group (formerly Philip Morris). She returned to Denver where she became a philanthropic force. She would serve as director on three boards: the Museum of Contemporary Art, the Legacy Media Institute and Save Venice. She is a past president of the Virginia Center for the Creative Arts and is a member of the Denver Foundation's Arts Affinity Group. She is president of the Denver Chapter of the Links Inc. a non-profit social and service group committed to enriching the lives of African Americans. In *The* Denver Post article she summed up her life by stating, "There are very few doors that I didn't open to see what was on the other side. I was a curious child..."

Alumni Scholarship Program Awards 2013

The original Alumni Scholarship fund, started in 1926, marks its 88th year. At the prompting of alum James E. Tracy, the fund was reactivated and reorganized in 1995 into a specific scholarship program distributing Alumni scholarships at the Senior Awards program each May to out-

standing, graduating seniors. Awards are based on specific qualifications, recommendations, written application, and an interview.

Since 2011, and the creation of the East Angel Friends & Alumni Foundation, the scholarship program has been supported and funded by the Foundation. Scholarships are also often provided by East alums, or a specific class in honor of a classmate, or as part of a reunion celebration. These scholarships make a difference! For some it makes attending college possible, and for others it makes a special choice a reality.

In May of 2013, with the generosity of the East Angel Friends & Alumni Foundation, Thomas W. Bean Foundation, the Epstein-Smith Family, James Reece, (1960) and the Class of 1973, 15 students received a total of \$35,000.

Elizabeth Greenberg received the special \$6,000 Alumni and Friends Scholarship. "Elizabeth is a remarkable young woman with an open and curious mind, an exemplary student, highly skilled and buzzing with curiosity and willingness to lead. She is intelligent, truly thoughtful and open to new ways of looking at an issue," as described by East teachers.

When asked about the value of

her East High education: "I have obviously benefited from the academic classes at East and the skills I have learned. But I have learned even more from the people. The most important lesson I learned from East: I can connect with anyone. As a Speech and Debate captain and yearbook editor, I

can be in a lab group with a member of the boys varsity basketball team, the biology expert for the school's Science Olympiad, and the lead in the fall play and we can all laugh at the same things and work together. It doesn't matter how little we share on the surface, we have all been educated to get along with one another no matter what differences may seem to pull us apart. And that's more of an education than I could have expected." An East Angel who will always represent herself and East High well!

In addition to the EAFAF Scholarships, two students received a **James E. Tracy** scholarship, a scholarship established by family and friends of former East principal and alum James E.Tracy. Three students, Con Law Team participants, received scholarships in honor of former Con Law student Emily L. Saslow.

A LOOK BACK

East Teacher Organized WWII Relief Effort



In 1948, Denver East High School became involved in Colorado's first Sister City and the second in the United States. In the

summer of 1947 **Amanda Knecht**, a French teacher at East, visited Brest, France and was moved by the devastation of the city. She returned with a mission to make a difference.

Brest, France, a lovely port city, was occupied much of the war by the Nazis. During the heavy Allied bombing during the latter part of the war, much of the city was destroyed, including libraries, hospitals and schools. Almost 5,000 flyovers and sorties eventually brought about the surrender of the occupying forces.

When Amanda Knecht returned to Denver, she shared her experiences with her students. During the school year of 1947-48, she and her students raised in excess of \$32,000 in spare change. The full amount was presented to the City of Brest to be used in rebuilding the Children's wing of the Brest City Hospital. In response to this gesture the city of Brest immediately proceeded with the concept of jumelageor (twinning) affiliation between Brest and the city of Denver.

Many more Sister Cities would follow. They were a testimony of the power of people-to-people contact between two cities which share a common interest.

East High Constitutional Scholars

'We the People ... The Citizen And The Constitution'

In May of 2013 the East High Constitutional Scholars Team placed third in the nation in the We the People: the Citizen and the Constitution competition in Washington, D.C. East has represented the Denver Public Schools and the State of Colorado well. It is significant that East has placed in the top 10 repeatedly in this demanding national academic competition — 20 top 10 placements, four of which were first place, out of 24 competitions. East has a long and proud history of Constitutional Scholars. Determined, hard-working East students, with wonderful school and community support, have set a high standard for all participating teams local and national.

In **April of 2014** East will not be representing Colorado in the National competition. Each year the East team has had to work harder to win the State competition everyone's goal has been "beat



East!" Cherry Creek School District's Grandview High School, after several years of such striving, and in spite of East's terrific team, finally managed to slip past East by a few points and win the State Championship. Heartbreaking, naturally, for team members and all involved in this rigorous academic effort, especially since it has only happened once before -Clear Creek County won the State

The national "We the People" competition, as it is now known, started the school year of 1987-1988 as part of the Bicentennial Celebration of the drafting of the U.S. Constitution. With the exception of one year (1989) East has participated in the competition since its inception. 2014 will be the 27th year of the national competition and East has represented Colorado 24 times. Team members, past and present, consider "Con Law" to be one of the most difficult and timeconsuming undertakings of their high school career — and one of the most rewarding

Over the 140 years of East High history, a friendly rivalry has existed between Denver South and Denver East High Schools. The



athletic teams often clashed in heated athletic competition. There were even some romantic stories that ended in what became known as "border marriages."

Beth Gower is a proud graduate of South High School, and yet she found her way to East High School, as a teacher, and then as a dedicated volunteer. She has become a loyal friend and supporter of East and its programs.

She is but one of dozens of other volunteers who have or are serving East High School. But, looking at her accomplishments, it becomes obvious that she deserves the distinction of being a special Angel. She has used her numerous leadership, persuasive, and organizational skills on a number of key projects.

Beth came to East as a teacher in 1981. In 1987, Principal Jim Tracy asked her to spearhead a movement to bring back the East High alumni association. Under her leadership the East Alumni and Friends Association was formed. She served in several leadership capacities for many years.

She was on the committee that proposed the idea of an East High museum in the tower and was responsible for its construction. She was on the original Alumni Heritage Hall committee and once again was a contributing manager with Joel Noble in building the

Heritage Hall cases, and later used

gram since 1988. She currently sits on the executive committee of the recently organized East High Angel Foundation. These are but a few examples of Beth's dedication and spirited work.

In order to succeed in these areas it takes vision, organization and a commitment to detail. Beth Gower has, over these many years done all of these. She epitomizes the old East creed of aristocracy: "...Service is the best test of success...and by serving as I would be served, I shall be a true citizen of East High..."

Page Family Donates To Library

The East High library became the site for a special ceremony honoring two distinguished East High alums who have spent their adult careers in the cause of diversity in public schools. They donated numerous volumes of works from their personal collection, published during the civil rights movement years. It is their desire that present day and future East students will be able to access the works which are stored in the East library and be aware of the history of segregation in the early years of the DPS and the changes that have happened since.

The East High School Diversity and Inclusivity Committee hosted the attair. This organization was created in 2011 in response to concerns by parents regarding issues of diversity in discipline policies and AP classes. The committee hosts were Marjorie Bellaire, Trini Gonzalez Hussein, Lonnie McCabe and East staff member Christine

When JoKatherine Holliman and Jerome Page attended East High School in the 1950s, they were living on the cusp of the civil rights era. Jerome graduated from East in1953 and was a track star and Katherine graduated in 1956. She was very active in the affairs of East High. But still, to be an African-American at East at that time was difficult. There were very few African-American students in a school of nearly 3,000 students.

JoKatherine and Jerome eventually married and experienced the civil rights movement in the 1960's. They were eye witnesses to the many changes that began to transform East High School into

an integrated school. Prior to the Fair Housing Act of 1959, a very small percentage of African-American students lived outside the red-lined areas that separated most white and black families.

JoKatherine graduated from Howard University and began her professional career in New York City and currently provides diversity training throughout the county and is presently a contract Clinical Social Work Therapist for the DPS. Jerome was one of the first African-Americans to join the Peace Corps. For over 37 years he was the President/CEO of the National Urban League for various cities in the U.S.

Missing Cherub Returns Home After A 53 Year Absence

Many mysteries abide at East High School and one has been the loss of beautiful statuary, most of which was brought over from Old East when it was razed in 1929. The most notable mystery has been what happened to the Minerva and Venus de Milo statues that used to grace the center staircase in the main lobby? On a smaller scale, at least one missing statue has returned to its home.

Back in the late '50s or early '60s (the exact date is hard to come by), a young, ardent East lad wished to show his love for a special East girl. He removed a three foot statue of a cherub from the Angel Garden and placed it in his dream girl's garden. Although the girl never dated the boy, the Angel remained with her until recently.

The cherub was returned to East and once again takes its place in



the Angel Garden in the South lawn area. It is a statue of a young angel with a paintbrush and palette. Welcome home Angel.

Every three years or so, the Heritage Hall Committee of EAFAF puts on a spectacular event honoring notable graduates of East (see related article).

EAFAF has provided seed monies to kick off the much needed counseling center renovation project. This is a very exciting prospect for the East community.

One of the many great programs that the EAFAF has is the Faculty and Student Grant program. Each fall, East faculty and staff are invited to apply for grant funds through this program. This year the committee funded 38 grant requests for funds totaling more than \$39,000. The grants are awarded to the faculty and staff at East to continue with their mission of providing the best educational opportunities and to experiment with new programs for all Angels. Below is a list of some of the grants funded this year.

- Funds for the music department to bring professional musicians into our classrooms

- Cooking classes for our special education students

Jerry Biffle, one of East High's most highly decorated athletes, was inducted into the Colorado High Schools Activities Association (CHSAA) Hall of Fame, January 29, 2014. He became the eighth East athlete/coach to be so

Jerry was the mainstay of the East High track team which captured state championships in 1944, 1945 and 1946. He won state titles in the 100 and 200 yard dashes, broad jump and high jump. He attended the University of Denver where he was a "one-man wrecking crew" leading the pioneers to their first Skyline League championship ever. He was named All-American in 1950.

He capped off his brilliant career by capturing the gold medal for the broad jump in 1952 in Helsinki, Finland. He had the privilege and honor of being trained by the legendary Jesse Owens.

He joins seven others of the East family in the CHSAA Hall of Fame: Adolph "Pat" Panek, Bill Weimar,

In October 2013, Cerake Geberkidane ran a record pace in the Colorado state cross country tournament. In doing so, he became only the second East harrier to actually capture first place in the state tournament. His brother Ashi Geberkidane, became the first East runner to win the CX Country title (2012). Cerake's record time of 15:48.2 broke the record set by his brother and earned Cerake the honor of being ranked fourth in the nation.

Cross country is a team sport and it is difficult for one person to win the title just on his own efforts. East High has won the team cross country title four times: 1958, 1959, 1964, 1967, but the highest individual ranking until 2012 was a second place finish in 1959 by Pete Nims and a third place finish by Tarry Harrison in 1965.

Several colleges are interested in Cerake and he has his sights on a spot on the Olympic team in 2016. "I want to attend a college that
